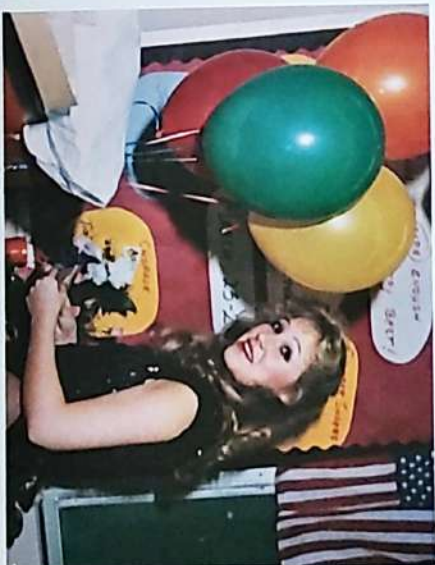
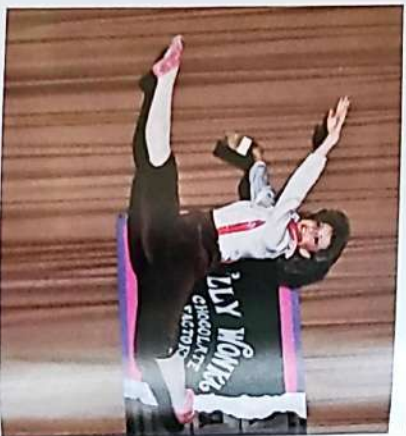
Excellence Is Terry Parker High School

Parker braves sported a lot of hot fashions this year. A person could hardly get bored keeping up with the many new trends.

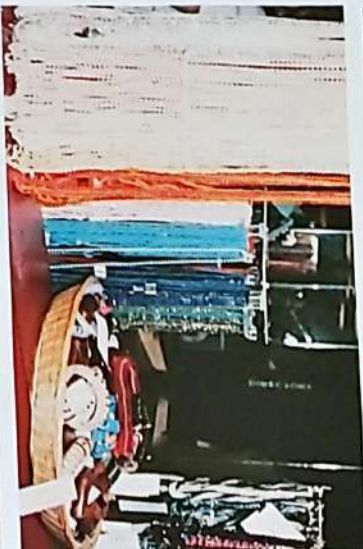

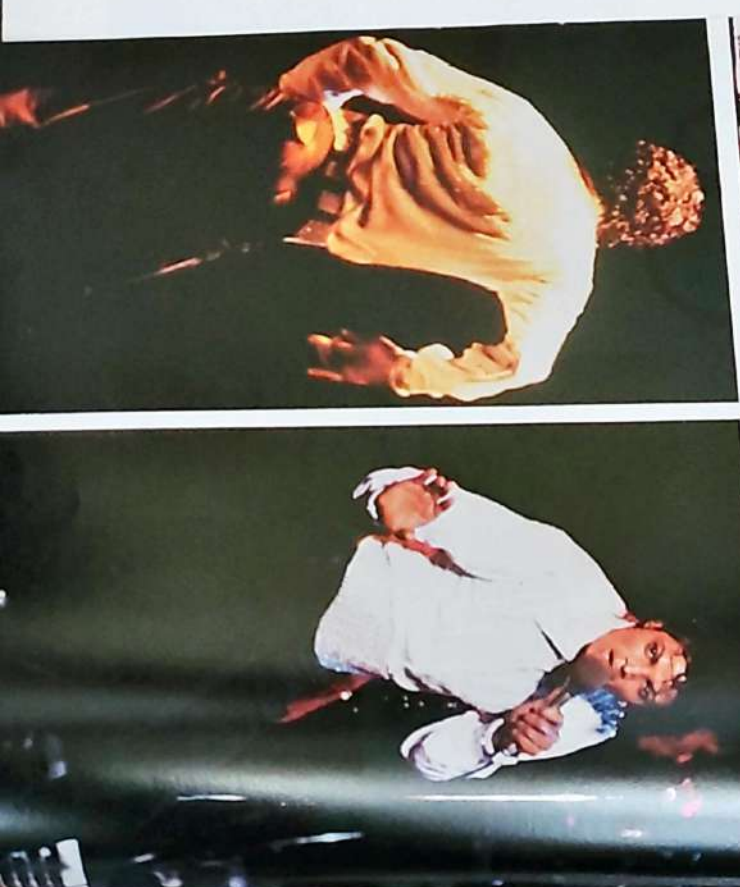
Blinded by the Light

In early 1984, Bruce McCandless took the first space walk from the shuttle Challenger using a manned maneuvering unit.

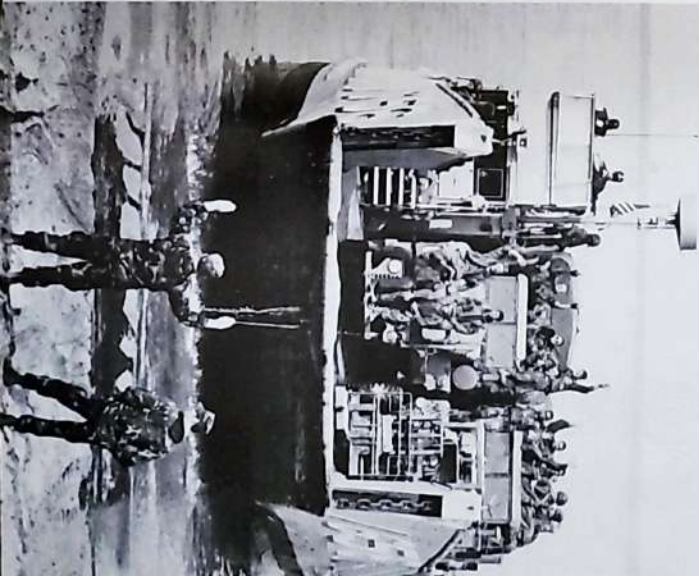
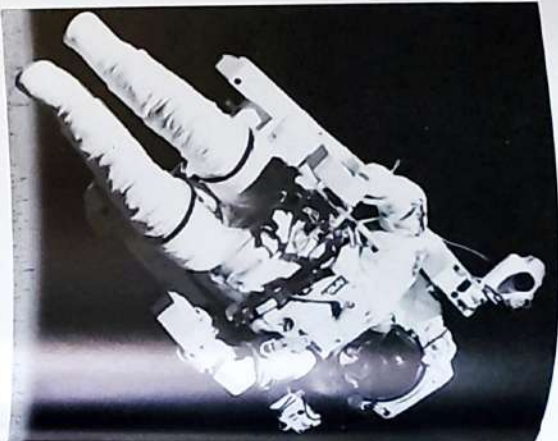
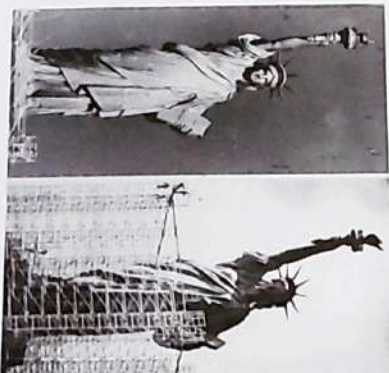

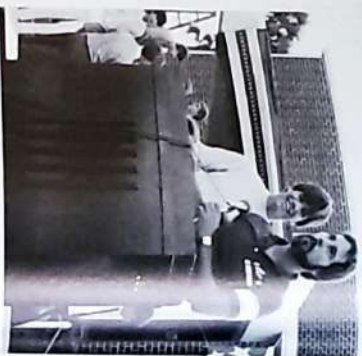

The Art of Language

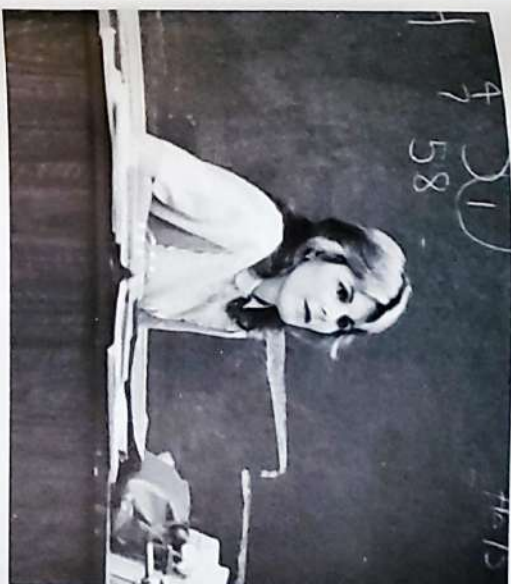
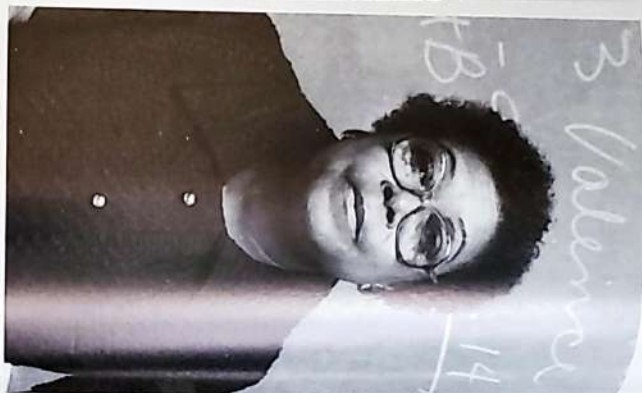

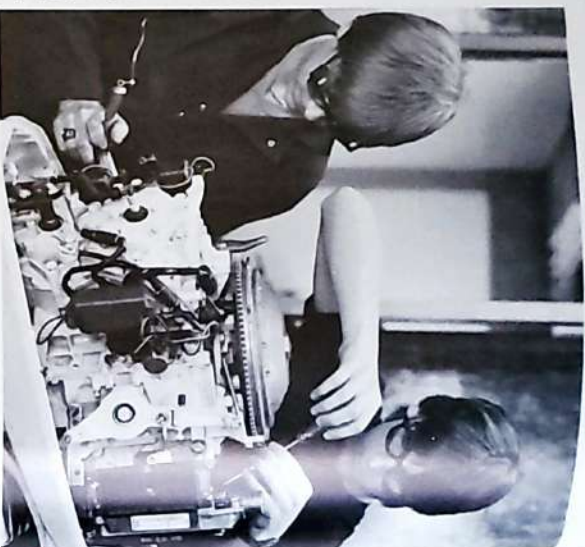
Students Learn new skills in Business-Coop

In Auto Shop, students are taught by Mr. Myers to repair all types of automobiles. The students may use this education to help them get a job or to repair their own cars.

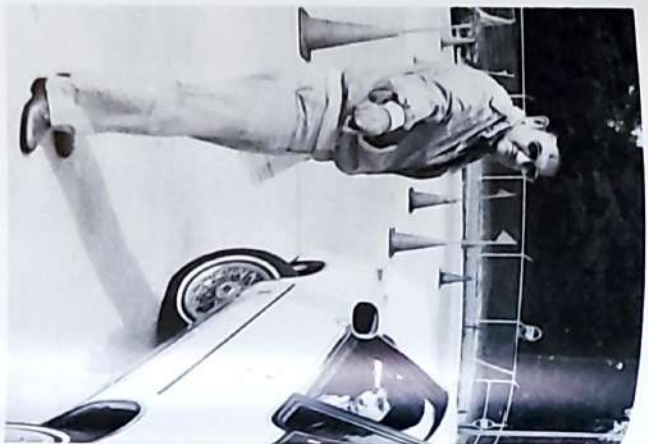
Mr. Spurrill is in charge of Commercial Arts. His class is instructed on how to create signs to be used for advertising. They have designed many displays for Parker this year.

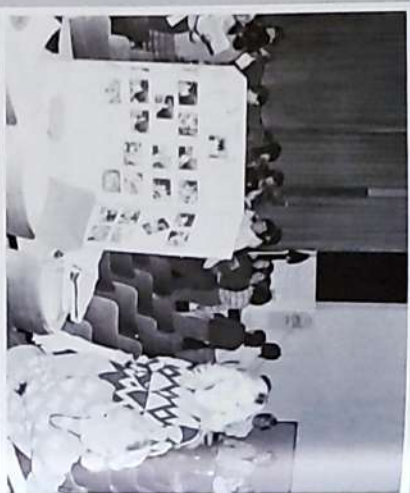
Recruiting New Members

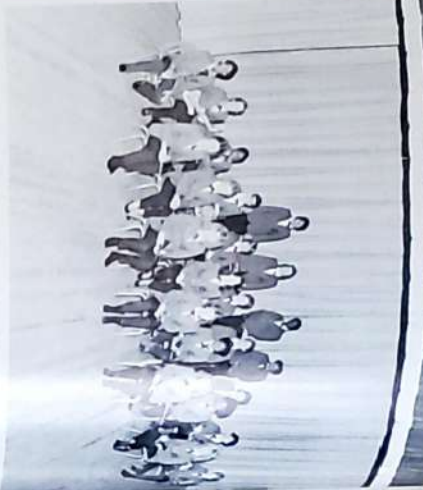

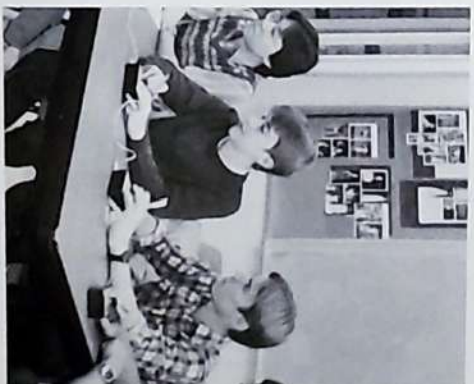

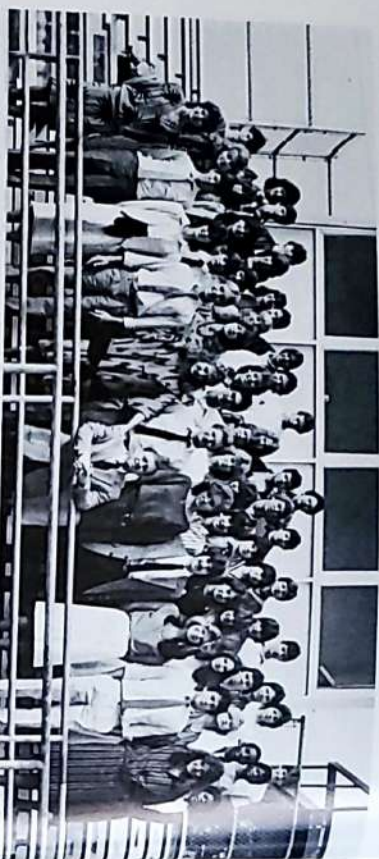

A Thespian Success

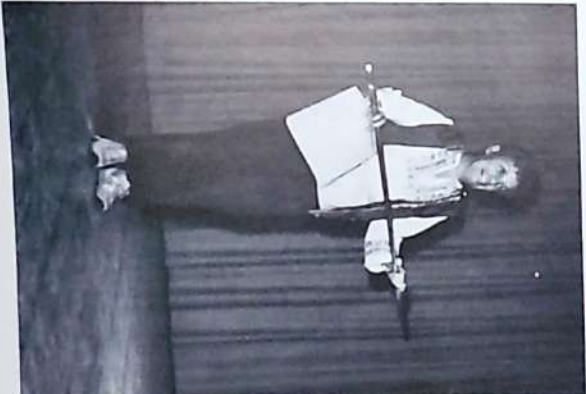

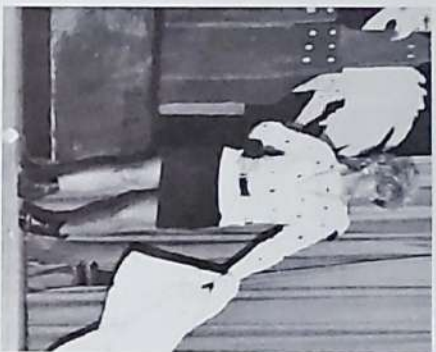


Unlocking The Future

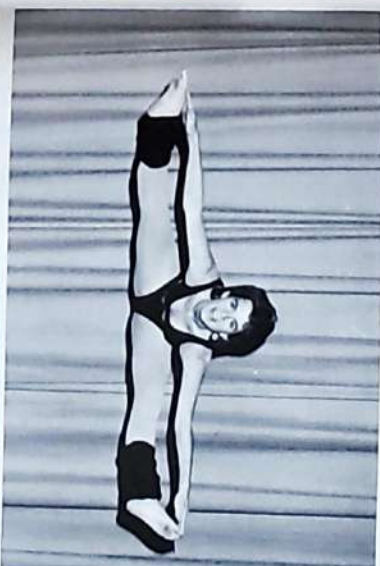

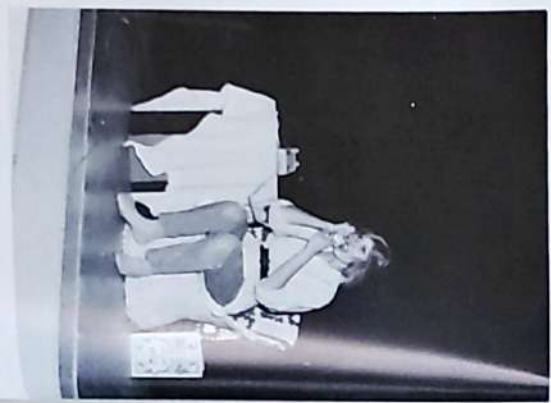

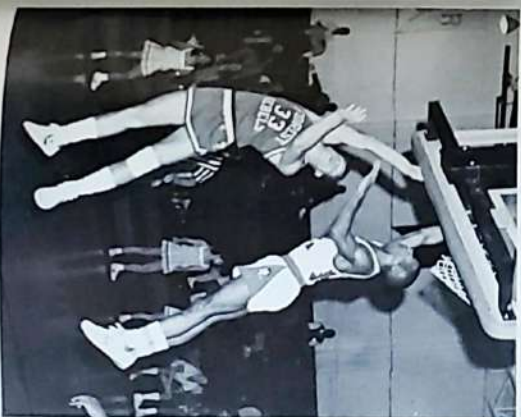
Bouncing Back

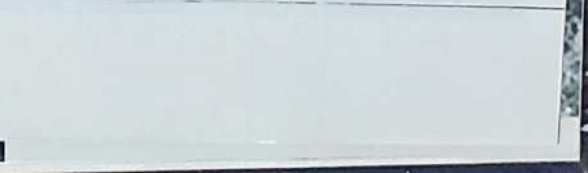

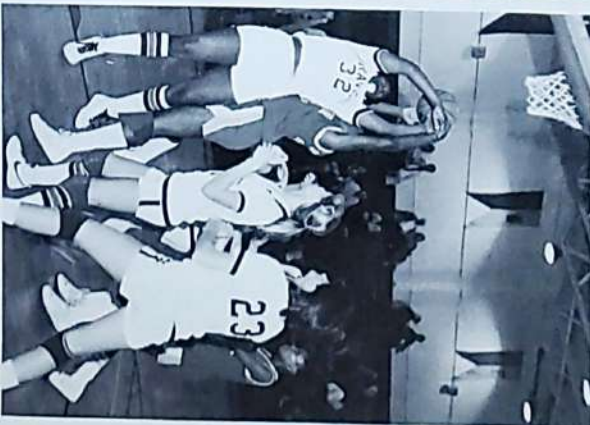

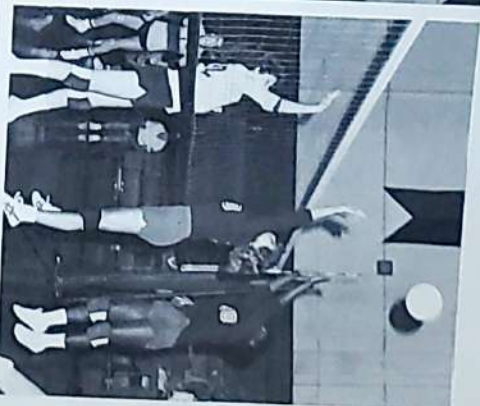

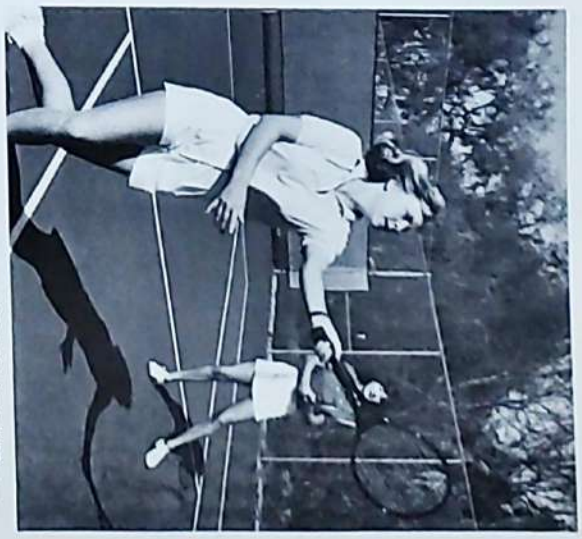
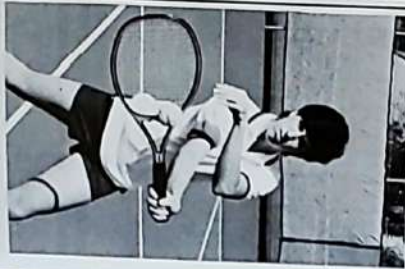
T.P. Leaves Opponents in No Man's Land
